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## ABOUT THE FELLOWSHIP PROGRAMS

The Commonwealth Fund Mongan Fellowship in Minority Health Policy (CFMF), formerly named The Commonwealth Fund/Harvard University Fellowship in Minority Health Policy, was established in 1996 through the support of The Commonwealth Fund. Under the direction of the Minority Faculty Development Program at Harvard Medical School and in collaboration with Harvard Medical School, Harvard School of Dental Medicine, Harvard T.H. Chan School of Public Health and the Harvard Kennedy School, the Fellowship is a one-year, full-time, academic degree-granting program designed to prepare physicians for leadership roles in transforming health care delivery systems and promoting health policies and practices that improve access to high performance health care for racial and ethnic minorities, economically disadvantaged groups, and other vulnerable populations. The program offers intensive study in health policy, public health, and management for physicians committed to transforming delivery systems for vulnerable populations. Fellows complete academic work leading to a Master of Public Health degree at the Harvard T.H. Chan School of Public Health, or a Master of Public Administration degree at the Harvard Kennedy School for those with a prior MPH degree. Fellows also participate in leadership forums and seminars with nationally recognized leaders in health care delivery systems, minority health, and health policy; site visits, shadowing, and practicum projects. The fellowship provides \$60,000 stipend, full tuition, health insurance, books, travel, and financial assistance for a practicum project.

In 2001, CFMF was joined by the California Endowment Scholars in Health Policy at Harvard University (CES) through the support of The California Endowment. The Scholars Program prepares California's outstanding physicians, dentists, and mental health providers to identify, analyze, quantify and develop solutions to public health and minority health problems through rigorous academic and leadership training. The goal of CES is to create a network of health professional leaders capable of advancing multicultural health interests in the public, non-profit and academic sectors.

The Joseph L. Henry Oral Health Fellowship in Minority Health Policy (est. 2005) has been supported by Delta Dental Massachusetts, Harvard School of Dental Medicine and previously the Health Resources and Services Administration (HRSA) through a cooperative agreement between the Office of Minority Health and the Minority Faculty Development Program at Harvard Medical School. The Oral Health Fellowship is a one-year academic degree-granting program, designed to create oral health leaders, particularly minority oral health leaders, who will pursue careers in health policy, public health practice and academia. The program is designed to prepare oral health leaders who will, over time, improve the capacity of the health care system to address the health needs of minority and disadvantaged populations.

Between 1996 and 2016, one hundred and twenty-four fellows and scholars have participated in these three fellowship programs. All alumni have been actively engaged in aspects of policy, research and service delivery related to minority health and public health. A significant number of alumni have assumed leadership positions in federal agencies, as well as state, county and city departments of health or in national and regional health organizations and associations. These health professionals, who have been well-trained academically and professionally in health policy, health management, and clinical medicine and who are deeply committed to service, have become leaders and change agents in creating high-performance health systems that respond to the needs of vulnerable populations.

### The Commonwealth Fund

The Commonwealth Fund—among the first private foundations started by a woman philanthropist, Anna M. Harkness—was established in 1918 with the broad charge to enhance the common good.

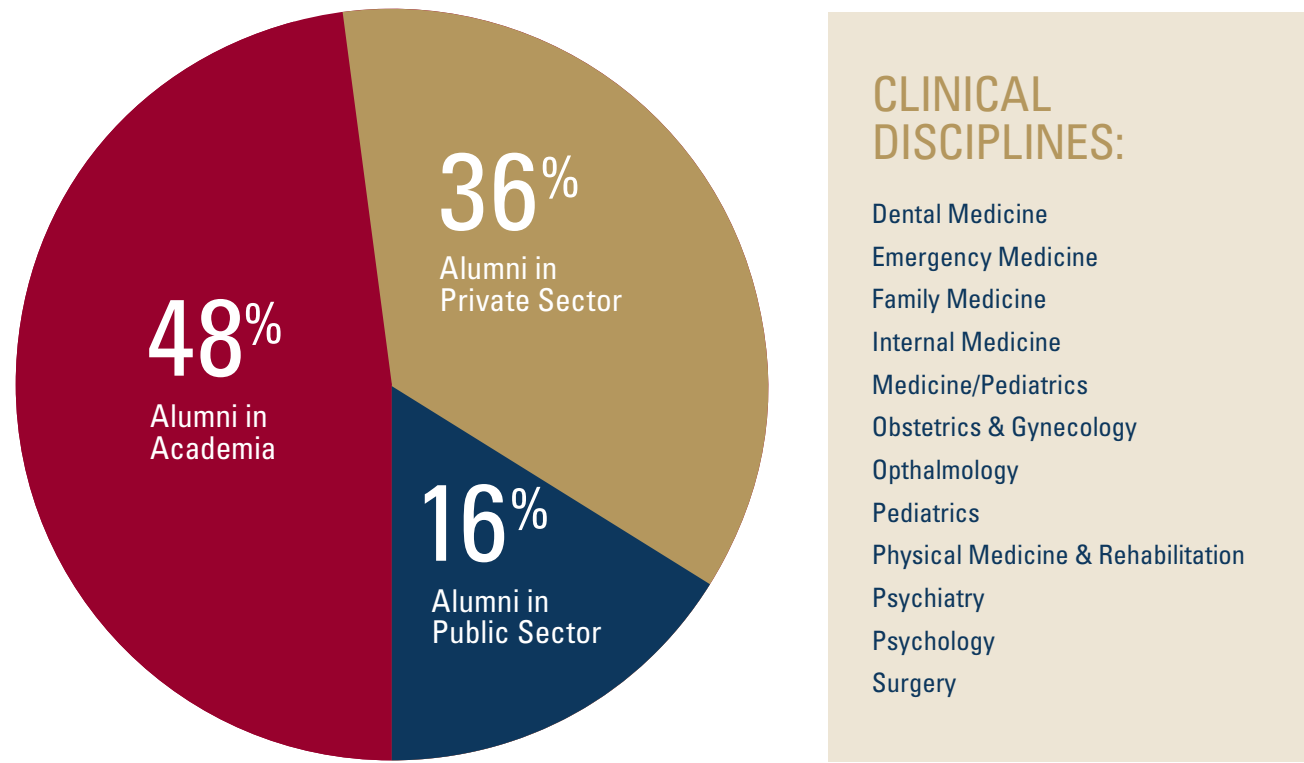

THE FIRST 20 YEARS

The Commonwealth Fund Mongan Fellowship welcomed its inaugural class in 1996. Now in its 20th year, 124 fellows have been trained, including California Endowment Scholars and Joseph L. Henry Oral Health Fellows.



72% have been invited for interviews on TV, radio and newsprint to discuss public health and minority health issues

70% have published in peer-reviewed journals. Between 1997 and 2015, 900 peer review articles, book chapters and other forms of scholarly work have been published

100% are engaged in policy, research and/or service delivery related to minority health and vulnerable populations

78% have held academic appointments at schools of public health and/or medicine

82% have conducted projects involving public health

93% serve on national/federal committees or advisory boards or state/local committees

“For two decades the Mongan Fellowship has helped to reshape America’s dialogue on health and health care. By training a cadre of leaders, the Fellowship built a network of change agents who are now spread in government, academia, health care and other key sectors. TIMELINE: ADVANCING MINORITY HEALTH (PARTIAL LISTING)\*

1985	<i>Report of the Secretary's Task Force on Black and Minority Health</i> , also known as the Heckler Report. The report documents the existence of health disparities among racial and ethnic minorities in the United States and called such disparities “an affront both to our ideals and to the ongoing genius of American medicine.”
1986	HHS establishes the <i>Office of Minority Health</i> . The Office of Minority Health is created in response to the <i>Heckler Report</i> . It is dedicated to improving the health of racial and ethnic minority populations through the development of health policies and programs that will help eliminate health disparities.
1990	<i>The Disadvantaged Minority Health Improvement Act of 1990</i> amends the Public Health Service Act to establish and authorize the Office of Minority Health.
1990	<i>Healthy People 2000</i> : National Health Promotion and Disease Prevention Objectives presented the Nation’s health improvement agenda for the last decade of the 20th century. It has three goals: to increase the span of healthy life, reduce health disparities, and to achieve access to preventive services. Addressing special population groups at high risk of poor health, Healthy People 2000 set specific targets to narrow the gap between the total population and those groups with higher than average rates of death, disease, and disability.
1996	The inaugural group of the <i>Commonwealth Fund Mongan Fellows in Minority Health Policy</i> matriculates.
1998	<i>The Health Professions Education Partnerships Act of 1998</i> reauthorizes the Office of Minority Health. This Act amends the Public Health Service Act to consolidate and reauthorize health professions, minority and disadvantaged health professions, and disadvantaged health education programs and other purposes.
1999	<i>The Health Care Challenge: Acknowledging Disparity, Confronting Discrimination, and Ensuring Equality</i> is a report by the US Commission on Civil Rights that examines the efforts of the US Department of Health and Human Services in the enforcement of nondiscrimination laws and their impact in on ensuring equal access to quality health care for all Americans, particularly women and racial and ethnic minority groups.
1999	<i>Mental Health: A Report of the Surgeon General</i> is issued at the culmination of a half-century that has witnessed remarkable advances in the understanding of mental disorders and the brain and in our appreciation of the centrality of mental health to overall health and well-being.
2000	<i>Healthy People 2010: Understanding and Improving Health</i> , a comprehensive, nationwide health promotion and disease prevention agenda. Healthy People 2010 represents the ideas and expertise of a diverse range of individuals and organizations concerned about the Nation’s health. It is committed to a single overarching purpose: promoting health and preventing illness, disability, and premature death in order to achieve two overarching goals— to increase quality and the years of healthy life and to eliminate health disparities.
2000	<i>National Standards for Culturally and Linguistically Appropriate Services (National CLAS Standards)</i> to improve health care quality and advance health equity. It establishes a framework for organizations to serve the nation’s increasingly diverse communities. Its principal standard is to provide effective, equitable, understandable and respectful quality care and services that are responsive to diverse cultural health beliefs and practices, preferred languages, health literacy and other communication needs.
2000	First alumnus Commonwealth Fund Fellow is appointed Director, HRSA Boston Regional Division. (Roderick King)
2002	<i>Unequal Treatment: Confronting Racial and Ethnic Disparities in Health Care</i> is published by the Institute of Medicine (IOM) to assess the extent of racial and ethnic disparities in health care.
2002	The first group of the <i>California Endowment Scholars in Health Policy at Harvard University</i> matriculates.
2003	<i>The World Oral Health Report 2003</i> outlines the current oral health situation at global level and the strategies and approaches for better oral health in the 21st century.



2003	First alumna Commonwealth Fund Fellow is apointed to serve as Health and Education Policy Advisor in the Office of Senator Edward M. Kennedy. <i>(Dora Hughes)</i>
2003	First alumnus Commonwealth Fund Fellow is appointed as Epidemic Intelligence Service Officer. <i>(Eduardo Azziz-Baumgartner)</i>
2003	First alumna Commonwealth Fund Fellow receives MacArthur Fellowship “Genius” Grant for work with circumcised women. <i>(Naval Nour)</i>
2004	<i>Missing Persons: Minorities in Health Professions</i> report is released by the Sullivan Commission on Diversity in the Healthcare Workforce to provide the nation with methods to achieve diversity in health professions.
2004	<i>Broken Promises: Evaluating the Native American Health Care System</i> report is released by the US Commission on Civil Rights examines the extent of the disparities in the health status and outcomes of Native Americans and explores the causes for those disparities.
2006	<i>Massachusetts Health Care Reform</i> establishes a new structures and requirements to promote the expansion of health insurance coverage in the state.
2007	<i>National Partnership for Action to End Health Disparities (NPA)</i> is established to mobilize a nationwide, comprehensive, community-driven, and sustained approach to combating health disparities and to move the nation toward achieving health equity.
2008	First African American President: Barack Obama is elected.
2008	<i>Closing the gap in a generation: health equity through action on the social determinants of health Final Report of the Commission on Social Determinants of Health</i> , Geneva, and World Health Organization is released. The Commission was created to marshal the evidence on what can be done to promote health equity and to foster a global movement to achieve it.
2008	First alumnus Commonwealth Fund Fellow is chosen to lead a mental health foundation: Hogg Foundation for Mental Health. <i>(Octavio N. Martinez, Jr.)</i>
2008	First alumna Joseph L. Henry Oral Health Policy Fellow is named President, National Dental Association Foundation, Inc. <i>(Cynthia Hodge)</i>
2008	First alumnus Joseph L. Henry Oral Health Policy Fellow is named Chief of Oral Health, Cambridge Health Alliance. <i>(Brian Swann)</i>
2008	<i>A Blueprint for the Health of Asian Americans, Native Hawaiians, and Pacific Islanders</i> report is released by the Asian & Pacific Islander American Health Forum calling for a change in policies, in systems, and in the fundamental ways that health is addressed for Asian Americans and Native Hawaiian and Pacific Islander communities.
2009	Sonia Sotomayor becomes the first Latina U.S. Supreme Court Justice.
2009	First alumna Commonwealth Fund Fellow is appointed to lead Indian Health Service. <i>(Yvette Ronbideaux)</i>
2010	<i>Healthy People 2020: An Opportunity to Address the Societal Determinants of Health in the United States</i> . Healthy People 2020 envisions a day when preventable death, illness, injury, and disability, as well as health disparities, will be eliminated and each person will enjoy the best health possible. This transformation will occur by changing our thinking about health, examining root causes and societal determinants, and directing more interventions to address primary, causal factors that affect health.

2010	<i>The Patient Protection and Affordable Care Act</i> ensures that all Americans have access to quality, affordable health care and will create the transformations within the health care system necessary to contain costs.
2010	<i>The Indian Health Care Improvement Act (IHCLA)</i> improves the facilitation of health care services.
2011	HHS launches two strategic plans aimed at reducing health disparities: the <i>HHS Action Plan to Reduce Racial and Ethnic Health Disparities</i> and the <i>National Stakeholder Strategy for Achieving Health Equity</i> . The five goals of the HHS Disparities Action Plan are to: transform health care, strengthen the nation's health and human services infrastructure and workforce, advance the health, safety, and well-being of the American people, advance scientific knowledge and innovation, and increase the efficiency, transparency, and accountability of the HHS programs.
2012	First alumna Commonwealth Fund Fellow is appointed Chair of Pediatrics, Ochsner Health System. <i>(Joan R. Griffith)</i>
2013	First alumnus California Endowment Scholar is appointed to direct a county health department, Alameda County Public Health Department. <i>(Muntu Davis)</i>
2013	<i>The National Standards for Culturally and Linguistically Appropriate Service in Health and Health Care (National CLAS Standards)</i> are updated to ensure an even stronger platform for health equity.
2014	First alumna Commonwealth Fund Fellow becomes a full professor of medicine. <i>(Alice Chen)</i>
2015	<i>Hispanic Health: ¡A la Buena Salud! – To Good Health!</i> is the first national study released by the CDC that examines the leading causes of death, risk factors, disease prevalence, and access to health services among US Hispanics and Latinos.
2015	First alumna Commonwealth Fund Fellow is appointed State Commissioner, Commissioner of the Massachusetts Department of Public Health. <i>(Monica Bharel)</i>

“Having a program to help train professionals to transform the health care delivery system and to improve access and quality of care for minority and disadvantaged groups was an inspired idea 20 years ago when this fellowship was established by Dr. Joan Reede. With the passage of the Affordable Care Act and the increasing need to develop and implement new approaches to care, the program is even more important now than it was originally. Its goals continue to be achieved by the ongoing successes of over 100 graduates.
